Conference Reports

2017 New Zealand Post-Election Conference

The latest in the Victoria University of Wellington political science programme's post-election conference series (dating back to 1987) was held on 6 December at The Legislative Council Chamber, Parliament. Leaders of all five of New Zealand's political parties represented in the Parliament elected in September 2017 took part, one after the other, in the well-attended conference, which included a highlight moment when Prime Minister Jacinda Ardern, midway through her keynote speech, spotted a group of children being taken on a tour through Parliament and invited them to come in and join the conference (an event captured by TVNZ's 'One News': see https://www.tvnz.co.nz/one-news/new-zealand/watch-jacinda-ardern-interrupts-speech-warmly-welcome-delighted-school-kids-into-room).

The conference was opened by Parliament's new Speaker, Trevor Mallard, and included special 'valedictory' speeches from former Members of Parliament Te Ururoa Flavell and Peter Dunne, reflecting on their political and parliamentary careers. Other conference presentations came from members of the media, pollsters and commentators, and academic contributors. The presentations, augmented by other chapters focusing on the 2017 campaign and on the 'legacy' of the outgoing National-led government, will be brought together in 'Stardust and Substance: New Zealand's 2017 Election', to be published by Victoria University Press in 2018 – the latest book in the Victoria University election series (which will also include a DVD of election campaign highlights).

2017 Australian Society for Quantitative Political Science Annual Conference

The Australian Society for Quantitative Political Science (ASQPS) Annual conference was held at Victoria University of Wellington on December 11 and 12 2017. About 50 attended, principally from Australia and New Zealand, with several others from further afield. 37 papers were presented in two streams, covering a wide range of topics within political science and international relations. The guest and plenary speaker was Professor Stephen Ansolabehere, Harvard University. The conference was followed by a postgraduate workshop on Wednesday December 12. A special issue of Political Science drawing on papers presented at the conference is in preparation.

Post-Doctoral Opportunities

Two-year Fixed-Term Post-Doctoral Fellowship from 1st July 2018 until 30th June 2020

Political Communication/Science Communication - School of Social Sciences, University of Auckland

With funding from the George Mason Centre for the Environment, this project seeks to solve two of the most vexing problems facing the science of sustainability and conservation—1) public misunderstanding of ecological science and 2) disengagement and lack of support for key sustainability policies and practices. The post-doctoral fellow will work with the principal investigator and the research team to design and implement a series of studies to understand and bridge the knowledge and engagement gap related to marine ecosystem science, conservation, and policy. S/he will help design and develop studies including producing scientifically based multimedia products and test them for effectiveness in conveying ecological understandings and for generating support for sustainable policies and solutions. The experiments will provide insights about how people consume science-based media, the gaps in understandings, and will inform future science communication. We seek suitably qualified candidates for a fixed-term post-doctoral candidate commencing July 2018. The successful applicant will also be expected to lecture at undergraduate and graduate level, and participate in workshops.

PhD Scholarships

Two PhD Scholarships in Shaping Public Policy

Scholars in the School of Population Health intend to offer two PhD Scholarships as part of a project investigating ways in which unhealthy commodity industries (alcohol, tobacco, gambling and food) influence public policy. The project is funded by a three-year researcher-initiated Government grant (from the Marsden Fund). Both PhDs will involve input from other investigators on the project including Professors Kypros Kypris (Newcastle NSW), Jeff Collin (Edinburgh), Jim McCambridge (York UK) and Boyd Swinburn (Auckland). The project will be based in the School of Population Health at the UOA Tamaki Campus.

Students eligible to enrol in a PhD will be able apply to the University Scholarship Office in early 2018. Both international and NZ domestic students are encouraged to apply.
