NZPSA/TKTToA 2022 Annual Conference: University of Waikato Te Hui ā-Tau: Te Whare Wānanga o Waikato

A reminder that this year's annual conference, which is being organised by friends and colleagues at Waikato University / Te Whare Wanganga o Waikato, will be held online from Tuesday 29th November - Thursday 1st December 2022. The conference theme, which is especially apt in the present socio-political context, globally and domestically, is '**Reclaiming Common Ground: A Key Challenge for Political Studies.**'

In addition to papers speaking directly to that theme, the organisers welcome submissions from all areas related to comparative politics, political theory, international relations, Māori politics, media and politics, gender politics, environmental politics, public policy and New Zealand politics. They also welcome proposals for panel sessions (3-4 speakers) and roundtable proposals related to the conference theme.

In related news to the review into electoral arrangements, a group called Generation Vote works on issues that may be of interest to some of you.





<u>Undergraduate and Postgraduate Essay Prizes</u> <u>Ngā Whakawhiwhinga Tuhinga a ngā Tauira Tohu Paetahi, Tohu Paerua</u>

At each year's Annual Conference, NZPSA/TKTToA awards 5 prizes for the best Undergraduate and Postgraduate essays. These prizes are:

- An Undergraduate prize for the best essay on Māori Politics submitted in a course at any Aotearoa New Zealand University.
- An Undergraduate prize for the best essay submitted in a course on Aotearoa New Zealand politics in a New Zealand University.
- A Postgraduate Conference Prize for the best paper in the field of Aotearoa New Zealand domestic politics.
- A Postgraduate Conference Prize in any other field of political studies.
- A Postgraduate Conference Prize for the best paper in the field of Environmental Politics and Policy.

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Kaitlin Martin-Feek

My name is Kaitlin Martin-Feek and I am one of two PhD representatives on the NZPSA board. I am a PhD in Political Science at Victoria, researching the All Blacks and Black Ferns (national rugby) in New Zealand to interrogate how we (re)construct national identity in settler-colonial societies.

Along with my colleague Jess, we run the social media pages for NZPSA postgrads, provide a first point of contact for any questions you may have about joining and participating, and are involved in planning the postgrad specific activities at the annual NZPSA conference. Our goal is to connect postgrads in PSIR around New Zealand, create opportunities for professional development, and encourage collaboration and community amongst our postgrads. PhD Profile

Claire Fitzpatrick completed her PhD at Te Herenga Waka Victoria University of Wellington in October 2021. Her dissertation entitled <u>Hu-</u> manity's Gone Viral (awarded the 2022 Sir Desmond Todd Prize for best Political Science or International Relations PhD) explores the role that hashtags play in maintaining political, social, and technological inequalities.



Claire Fitzpatrick

It argues that the use of collectivising hashtags affords new opportunities for self-expression that simultaneously empower and compromise certain individuals. It is written in response to experiences of racism shared via the #TheyAreUs, #ThatsUs, and #ThisIsNotUs hashtags that trended following the terror attack on Muslim communities in Ōtautahi, Christchurch. Her analysis encourages users to think critically about the affecting nature of their online practices, or risk becoming complicit in the wider relations of power in which discrimination, oppression, and violent extremism fester.

The findings of Claire's research have contributed to the New Zealand Human Rights Commission's Give Nothing to Racism and Voice of Racism behaviour change digital campaigns, and have also been shared with the New Zealand High Commission in France and French Digital Council as a part of the Christchurch Call to Action Summit.

Since finishing her thesis, her work has been published in the Feminist Journal of International Politics and she is currently preparing chapters for a monograph. Her emerging research area contributes to burgeoning feminist conversations on the embodied and affectual workings of vulnerability, ignorance and precariousness in digital atmospheres. Claire is currently a teaching fellow in International Relations and Political Communications at Victoria University of Wellington.
