## Networks Update

Due to our <u>new rules</u> introduced last year, all of our networks are being audited in January to ensure that they still have 10 members. Due to inactivity, the <u>Media and Political Communication Network</u> and the <u>Interpretative Policy Analysis Network</u> were given two years notice at the AGM to start operating effectively before they will be dissolved. The <u>Gender and Politics Network</u> has one year remaining to report some activity.

# **New Membership Fees**

The <u>AGM decided</u> that as our commitments were larger than our income, we needed to increase fees slightly. The standard membership fee for 1 year is now \$65, and for 3 years \$180 (i.e., \$60 per year). We also have a new 5 year standard membership at \$300. The postgraduate fee remains the same bargain at \$10 per year.
